

# THE HOT LIST 2016

With its edgy urban location and bonsai version of minimalism, this is one of the most fascinating hotels to have opened in Hong Kong in years. At first, it's a bit of a puzzle, as it's set on a workaday street just east of Victoria Park and has no sign outside. Inside, the moodily dark first-floor lobby is almost entirely taken up by a brass-topped reception desk that could double as an altar. Upstairs, the 66 bedrooms are stacked up Jenga-like with no more than three per floor, their bare concrete or wooden walls untroubled by anything as intrusive as an artwork. But the roomy bathrooms are marble, the mini-bars are loaded with Dutch craft beer, and there a portable smartphone for free calls to the UK (and four other countries). The ground-floor SILVER ROOM restaurant is hidden behind black steel folding doors, and does a particularly good poached Spanish mackerel with Japanese clams. It's only open for lunch and dinner: for breakfast, venture out for excellent dim sum at the nearby Royal Legend, home-made yogurt at the SillyBoo Cafe, or grab a takeaway from Violet Cake Shop, where the piquant raisin buns are baked on the premises.
